SERIES INTRODUCTION: The Unsung Heroes of Scripture

Theme:

We're exploring biblical figures who walked with God but are often overlooked.

Why do these stories matter?

- 1. They show how God values people the world often calls insignificant.
- 2. They remind us that even if our walk with God feels small, it matters deeply.

JESUS ON PEACEMAKING

Matthew 5:9 (MSG)

"You're blessed when you can show people how to cooperate instead of compete or fight. That's when you discover who you really are, and your place in God's family."

Key Thought:

Peace is not passive. It's often created in tension, fear, and conflict.

ABIGAIL: The Wise Intercessor (1 Samuel 25)

Who Was Abigail?

- Sensible and beautiful woman married to Nabal (whose name means fool).
- Lived during David's time as a warrior, before he became king.

The Situation:

- David requests hospitality from Nabal after protecting his workers.
- Nabal insults David → David prepares for violent revenge.
- A servant warns Abigail.

Abigail's Response (1 Samuel 25:18-35)

- Acts quickly: prepares food & rides to meet David.
- · Humbly intercedes on Nabal's behalf.
- · Reminds David of his destiny and God's promises.
- David listens, praises God, and spares Nabal.

Why Is Abigail a Peacemaker?

- She uses wisdom, humility, and courage.
- She **intercedes for a fool**, takes the blame, and turns away violence.
- A woman speaking into a powerful man's life—and he listens!

How Does She Point to Jesus?

- Abigail places herself between judgment and a guilty person.
- She takes blame to stop destruction—like Jesus did for us.
- Her story mirrors Christ's sacrificial love.

ANANIAS: The Brave Disciple (Acts 9:10–18)

Who Was Ananias?

- A faithful believer living in Damascus.
- Sent by God to heal Saul (a.k.a. Paul), a known persecutor of Christians.

The Situation:

- Jesus appears to Saul → Saul is blinded.
- God sends Ananias to pray for and baptize Saul.

Ananias' Hesitation:

- "Lord, this man has harmed believers!"
- God says: Go—Saul is My chosen instrument.

Ananias' Obedience:

- He goes and calls Saul "Brother Saul."
- Lays hands on him → Saul regains sight, is baptised, and becomes Paul.

Why Is Ananias a Peacemaker?

- He faced fear and chose obedience.
- He bridged the gap between the church and its enemy.
- Through him, Saul was welcomed, healed, and empowered for ministry.

- 3. Who is your David—someone heading toward harm or anger—who needs your courage and wisdom?
- 4. What does it look like for you to be a peacemaker in your family, school, or community?

FINAL CHALLENGE

"Peacemaking is hard, but it is holy."

- Peacemakers **step into conflict** with courage and **obey God** even when it's uncomfortable.
- God doesn't need status—He uses willing hearts.

Will you be a peacekeeper like Abigail or Ananias?
